ADDITIONAL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL STUDENTS

Junior Research Exhibition (JREX)

All CCHS graduates must complete a multi-disciplinary research exhibition in the junior year that requires them to effectively articulate a well-researched and scholarly argument in an area about which they are passionate. Students must produce a paper of 10-15 pages using media, hard and digital sources, as well as personal interviews and present their work in a polished presentation before a panel of faculty and experts in the students' areas of pursuit.

Leadership Program

The co-curricular CCHS Leadership Program centers around our **Core Values**—courage, wisdom, justice, and charity—anchored in a spiritual, ethical, and moral life. **Leadership events include** student retreats, service days, wilderness adventures, and mission trips—supported by training in outdoor skills and first aid. Students experience Servant Leadership, Situational Leadership, and Team Leadership to develop the character and skills of a 21st century leader.

Tier 1 participation is required of all CCHS students and involves leadership camp each August and a week of community service each October, which results in 1 credit of Leadership Skills Development, typically awarded junior year. Students who want to develop further as leaders may elect Tier 2 participation, which additionally requires at least two Winter Expeditions (week-long service trips in January), two Vision Quests (two nights of solo camping and spiritual reflection), and at least one mission trip (typically eight days in Panama and/or the Navajo Nation), which may qualify students for 1 credit of Engaged Citizenship, awarded senior year. Beginning sophomore year, students may choose to undergo a rigorous, 3-stage tryout process to become Senior Leaders Tier 3, the elite servants of the CCHS Leadership Program. Senior Leaders receive advanced training in wilderness first aid and CPR, wilderness survival, and leading and organizing small teams, and they must attend all Senior Leader training events. Senior leaders are also held to the highest standards of responsibility, spirituality, and integrity, exemplifying the qualities of a Servant Leader in personal and public life.
